NON CONSENT RESOLUTIONS

Mayor Yates reported that Mr. & Mrs. DeSimone of 156 Lee's Hill Road are the recipients of the Historic House of the Year for 2019. Mayor Yates read Resolution TC 19-134 in its entirety.

Resolution TC 19-134 -- Historic Preservation Commission - Historic House of the Year

WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission of Harding Township would like to present a residential home that adds aesthetic value and interest to the community; and

WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission is proud of the homes that contribute to the historical character of the Township; and

WHEREAS Historic Districts recognize the architectural importance of commercial and residential buildings all across the nation that preserve the character and identity of the township; and

WHEREAS, the Historic House of the Year will be a chance for the Historic Preservation Commission to highlight a property that enhances the historical character in Harding Township; and

WHEREAS, the home that the Historic Preservation Commission wishes to highlight should be viewed from the road, enhance the streetscape, display proper use of materials and have an architectural style that complements the rural character of Harding Township; and

WHEREAS, Harmony Hill Farm located at 156 Lee's Hill Road is a classic American Foursquare built around 1903 as an equestrian center; and

WHEREAS, it is a traditional two-story, square-footprint home with a hip roof, hip dormers and a porch that spans a considerable length of the front facing facade; and

WHEREAS, the present owners, John and Adrienne DeSimone have added historically appropriate windows, moldings, simulated shake siding and a simulated slate roof with copper accents; and

WHEREAS, Harmony Hill Farm located at 156 Lee's Hill Road is noted as a contributing property in the Logansville District in the Harding Township's Historic District Inventory.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and the Township Committee of Harding Township in the County of Morris and State of New Jersey that the property known as Harmony Hill Farm located at 156 Lee's Hill Road is hereby chosen as Historic House of the Year for 2019.

Mrs. Gwenn Claytor informed the DeSimone's that a plaque with the resolution is forthcoming and informed the public if you are interested in submitting your house for Historic House of the year, please submit your application to Lori Tagliarino by September 30, 2019.

The Township Committee thanked the DeSimone's for the work completed on their house.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

1. Dickson's Mill Bridge - Chris Vitz, Morris County Engineer

Mr. Chris Vitz, Engineer for Morris County and Roslyn Khurdan, Assistant County Engineer, made a presentation to the Township Committee and members of the public regarding the condition of the Dickson's Mill Bridge. Mr. Vitz mentioned that the bridge is an existing concrete span bridge. The abutments underneath are covered with concrete and are originally from 1923. There is stone covered with concrete. The rest of the span was replaced in 1984. The State's bridge and inspection cycle inspects the roads and bridges every two years. In 2001, they noted that there was a large crack in one of the abutments underneath the bridge as well as scour underneath the bridge. The abutment is being undermined. The County has placed large stones and pumped in some concrete into the settlement, but the crack remains and continues to grow.

This bridge is still noted as a structurally deficient bridge and functionally obsolete. It has been on the radar of Morris County since 2001 to replace the structure. There has been some discussions with regard to the overall width of the bridge and in 2015, Morris County went before the Township's Historic Preservation Commission and discussed the reasoning for the County to go with a 26 foot wide bridge compared to the existing 20 foot wide bridge (24 ft. rail to rail). Morris County follows the AASHTO Bridge guidelines for their structures, and 26 feet is the minimum that the County goes with. Mr. Platt did some research for Morris County to see if the State would fund a narrower than 26 foot width. Mr. Vitz explained that this project has not moved forward since 2015. Morris County is ready to design a 26 foot wide bridge (two 10 ft lanes with 3 ft shoulders), but if the Municipality is looking at something narrower than 26 feet, Morris County would look back to the Municipality to fund that design.

Mr. Platt explained that the last offer was if the Township wanted to take on the engineering and the building of the bridge and take it up with the State to see if the Township could go with the footprint category that recognizes the historical nature of the bridge. Mr. Platt believes a 24 foot wide bridge with two 12 foot lanes curb to curb would be better than the 26 feet wide bridge currently being proposed. Mr. Platt explained that Z 06-24-2019

keeping the curve in the bridge is a speed dampener. The Historic Preservation Commission believes the curve is an important part of the bridge as well as the stone.

Mayor Yates asked for a detailed condition of the bridge. Ms. Khurdan explained the concrete box springs have been taking in water, the asphalt on top is cracked, and the beams are starting to rot. Morris County is concerned with a giant hole forming. Morris County will test the beams to see how many beams require replacement. Morris County is looking at getting a design and to commence construction within the next 1 ½ years. Mayor Yates asked how close Morris County is to closing the bridge. Ms. Khurdan explained that if there is a severe rain storm and a tree comes down and hits the abutment, the structure can be lost. Any storm could have a possible effect.

Mayor Yates mentioned that a resolution will be required for the July 15th Township Committee meeting and explained that this project has been delayed for many years and this bridge is truly at its end of life and is a safety hazard. This is an artery for the Green Village Fire Company. In 2015, a traffic study was conducted that showed that 463 cars a day travel this bridge.

Mr. Platt explained that we are at 24 feet for the bridge and Morris County is a 26 feet. Mr. Vitz explained that we would have to get a design exception for the 24 feet and this bridge would still show up on the State's list as functionally obsolete. A discussion ensued. It was noted that Mr. Vitz stated the curve in the bridge would remain and the bridge would be threaded through the trees.

Mrs. DiTosto explained she is good with the 26 foot wide bridge and asked if the bridge could possibly be assembled off site and done in one week. Mrs. DiTosto mentioned that when the bridge on Route 202 was conducted it was built off site. If you could use that bridge as a model to help move this project on an accelerated basis that would be good.

Mr. Modi mentioned with the 26 foot wide bridge, Harding Township would accept no liability in the design, the plan, and the installation. Mr. Vitz, responded that is correct. Mr. Fox, Township Engineer, agreed with Mr. Modi's summary. Mr. Fox explained that if the Township goes with a narrower bridge, the Township would be required to fund the design and then the Township would need to see if the State would fund the project. Since this has been delayed for so long, does the Township want to risk a potential failure.

The following comments were made by members of the public:

- * Kenneth Friedman, 58 Dickson's Mill Road Commented that the County calls it guidelines, they can change it. The most important factor is the safety. Right now there is a natural safety facture there; no car will pass while another car is on the bridge. If you take three feet onto his neighbor's property, there is not much space being left for this resident before the fence. If the curb is not there, the railing will be knocked down. Mr. Friedman commented that you are taking the charm of Harding Township away. Bikers, pedestrians and horses use this bridge. Mr. Friedman believes a one-way bridge would speed the traffic up.
- * Nik Bjorkedal, 7 Cherry Lane Commented how wide would a one way bridge be to stay in the County funding. Mr. Vitz responded that it would depend on the number of vehicles and this bridge at 26 feet is at the minimum. Mr. Bjorkedal believes this would create a more significant of a hazard because of the narrowness in the road and trees that line that road. The road is a pedestrian and cyclist highway. Pedestrians, cyclists, and groups use this bridge. By widening the road, would promote more traffic. Mr. Bjorkedal believes that you would be taking a resource away from the people. Mr. Bjorkedal asked for restrictions to be placed on the bridge to stop speeding, etc. Asked if there was any environmental study done for the change of this bridge and the slowing of the speed of the water.

* Julia Somers, Spring Valley Road – Commented that she has driven this bridge for many years. Delighted that the curve will remain, the curve is very important. Believes a traffic hazard is being created and that this will create funding for the Township. The road is the Town's problem. Believes this will create traffic, safety, and speed concerns. This is a very special bridge, do not widen it. Mentioned that if you could take a look at the Route 202 Bridge. That bridge was constructed offsite and completed in one week. Commented that Hunterdon County has narrow bridges. It can be done. Mrs. Sommers mentioned that she could invite her trustee from the NJ Highland's Coalition to come in and speak to the Township Committee.

Mayor Yates explained that having your trustee come in would continue the conversation next month, however a resolution is necessary for the July meeting. Mayor Yates explained that NJDEP does not allow an increase of the structure of the stream water. This is restricted. We have a bridge that is at its end of life cycle. The Township does not have the funds for this bridge. Mr. Platt explained it is structurally deficient only.

- * Mr. Modi, Township Committee Member Based on the projected 26 feet wide, can the road be one way so one car can go through the drive lane and equestrians, bikers, pedestrians use the other side as a walkway.
- * Mr. Platt, Township Committee Member Commented that he is willing to contact the State to see if the State would fund a narrow road. Mr. Vitz explained if the bridge is approached two way, the bridge would have to be two way. The bridge cannot be narrowed for a one way bridge. Mayor Yates explained that Morris County has different standards than the State. However, if you receive a response before the July 15th meeting, we will continue the discussion.

Van Beuren Road Bridge

Mr. Vitz mentioned that the Van Beuren Road Bridge is a temporary bridge and was built 32 years ago. This bridge is functionally obsolete and is the last temporary structure for the County. It is rusting, labor intensive and is held together with pins. Mr. Paul Fox, Township Engineer explained that this bridge is important for fire safety.

2. Chase Bank - Chris Yates

Mayor Yates explained that he has not been able to get in contact with Chase Bank for a meeting.

3. 2020 DOT Project - Paul Fox

Mr. Fox explained that the Township will apply for the 2020 DOT funding cycle. Mr. Fox asked Mr. Toribio, DPW Superintendent to evaluate his road list. The recommendation for the next DOT funding cycle will be to look at Sand Spring Road from Blue Mill to Silverbrook. Mr. Fox explained this would be a full overlay. A discussion ensued. Mr. Fox will prepare his portion of the grant application for the July 15th Township Committee approval.

MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

NOTICE OF PUBLIC COMMENT TIME LIMIT

Hearing of citizens during the Public Comment section of the Agenda is an opportunity for any member of the public to be heard about issues which are/are not topics scheduled for Public Hearing tonight. To help facilitate an orderly meeting, and to permit all to be heard, speakers are asked to limit their comments to a reasonable length of time.

Mayor Yates opened the meeting for public comment.

Marian Harris—Commenting on behalf of the Cultural Resources Subcommittee of the NJ Highlands Coalition and the Morris County Trust for Historic Preservation, which is not part of the County government it is an independent non-profit. Ms. Harris commented that she was pleased to see that her comments made at the Planning Board last month made it into the Planning Board report.

Ms. Harris commented on the easement -- with respect to the protected elements of the Glen Alpin Building, what the developer is required to do (or person donating the easement), is on one hand not change the protected elements and on the other hand maintain the protected elements. This leaves a possibility for someone to say they did not change it, they were just maintaining it. If it is not done properly to the standards, that could go wrong before the Trust comes around to make its annual inspection. If this strikes the Township Committee as a serious change that should be placed in the easement, then the Township should speak with their attorney to see if this is a concern.

Ms. Harris commented that she is confused as to the way the easement is named, expected the easement to be called Glen Alpin/Hurstmont, but some items are called Hurstmont and other items are called Glen Alpin. Ms. Harris made mentioned that the Township has chosen not to have a conservation easement but that the preservation easement is enough. Mr. Modi explained that what was submitted was required by the State. Mr. John Hague, Special Counsel, explained that it would be helpful that the criticisms be put in writing so that they can be reviewed with the document in terms of correctness and then comments can be made in terms of correctness and solutions.

Ms. Harris commented that she raised a concern with the Planning Board that there is no credentialed preservation supervision of the process. It is applied differently under the Glen Alpin easement and to the Hurstmont property under whatever protections turn out to be in the redevelopment plan. Preservation Supervision should be included in the document.

Ms. Harris mentioned she brought up her concern with regards to the Revolutionary War to the Planning Board and believes that an archeologist should be retained. This is an important concern.

Mayor Yates thanked Ms. Harris for coming this evening and speaking before the Township Committee. The Township Committee is committed and have mentioned many times about respecting the historical nature of these properties. Mayor Yates asked that Ms. Harris summarize her comments and send them to the attention of Mr. Falzarano, Township Administrator.

Mary Prendergast, President of the Glen Alpin Conservancy — Commented on the following items regarding the Glen Alpin House:

- * Security Concerns Alarm continues to go off
- * Keys concerned too many people have keys, the doors are being left open
- * Building condition not good
- * Grass is high
- * How will the grave site and markers be maintained and kept accessible?
- * Would appreciate better maintenance

Mr. Jones explained the grave site and marker are currently on the diversion and easement negotiations.

Business Opportunities:

Mr. Jones, explained that the Township was approached by someone who expressed interest to open a business that is currently not a clearly defined business under Chapter 225-145. The business was to teach coding and video game information. It was the opinion of the Zoning Officer and the Township Attorney that this business does not meet the permitted use. The Township Attorney explained that the Ordinance should be revisited as some of the permitted uses in the B2 zone are archaic. A discussion ensued. Mayor Yates asked that Mr. Falzarano, Township Administrator send a memorandum to the Planning Board to accelerate the review of the B2 and B1 zones with regard to their restrictive uses are currently described.

Mayor Yates closed the public comments at 9:00 p.m.

TC Resolution 19-135 – RESOLUTION ACCEPTING THE REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD CONCERNING THE HURSTMONT REDEVELOPMENT PLAN

WHEREAS, on November 19, 2018, the Township Committee of Harding Township adopted Resolution #18-196, directing the Planning Board to undertake a preliminary investigation to determine whether the properties identified as Block 27, Lot 2, located at 679 Mt. Kemble Avenue (the "Hurstmont Parcel") and Block 34, Lot 1 (the "Glen Alpin Parcel") (collectively referred to as the "Redevelopment Study Area") qualify as a "non-condemnation" area in need of redevelopment pursuant to the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-1, et seq. (the "Redevelopment Law"); and

WHEREAS, on February 19, 2019, the Planning Board conducted a duly-noticed public hearing, pursuant to *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-6, during which the Planning Board considered the preliminary investigation report of Heyer, Gruel & Associates ("HGA"), dated February 1, 2019 (the "Preliminary Investigation Report"), and heard the testimony of Susan S. Gruel, P.P. and McKinley Mertz, P.P. of HGA concerning the Preliminary Investigation Report; and

WHEREAS, after the Planning Board hearing and consideration of the Preliminary Investigation Report, the Planning Board determined that the Redevelopment Study Area meets the criteria for designation as an area in need of redevelopment under the Redevelopment Law and recommended that the Harding Township Committee designate the Redevelopment Study Area as an area in need of redevelopment, pursuant to the Redevelopment Law; and

WHEREAS, the Harding Township Committee accepted the recommendation of the Planning Board and, on February 25, 2019, via Resolution #TC-073, designated the Redevelopment Study Area as a "non-condemnation" redevelopment area; and

WHEREAS, on May 13, 2019, on behalf of Harding Township, HGA prepared a redevelopment plan for the Redevelopment Study Area, dated May 13, 2019 (the "Hurstmont Redevelopment Plan"), and referred such plan to the Planning Board for review and comment, pursuant to *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-7; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Board considered the Hurstmont Redevelopment Plan at its meeting of May 20, 2019 and submitted a report of its review of the Hurstmont Redevelopment Plan dated June 3, 2019 (the "Report") to the Harding Township Committee; and

WHEREAS, On June 24, 2019 the Harding Township Committee reviewed the Report and the recommendations made therein; and

WHEREAS, the Harding Township Committee has considered the five specific recommendations of the Report which generally related to 1) traffic, 2) public safety, 3) a Revolutionary War encampment site, 4) retention of a historic preservation professional, and 5) landscape design (the "Recommendations") all of which the Harding Township Committee recognizes as valid concerns; and

WHEREAS, the Harding Township Committee has determined that the Recommendations constitute details that should be addressed in the Redevelopment Agreement to be negotiated between the Township and the Redeveloper; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee has determined that there is no need to revise the Hurstmont Redevelopment Plan to address the Recommendations.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Township Committee of the Township of Harding that:

- 1. The Report is accepted by the Township Committee; and
- 2. That this Resolution shall be entered into the minutes of the June 24, 2019 Township Committee meeting in response to the Recommendations pursuant to NJSA 40A:12A-7.

TC Resolution 19-136 – RESOLUTION DESIGNATING HURSTMONT ESTATE ACQUISITION, LLC AS THE REDEVELOPER FOR THE GLEN ALPIN/HURSTMONT REDEVELOPMENT AREA

WHEREAS, the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1, et seq., as amended and supplemented ("LRHL"), provides a process for municipalities to participate in the redevelopment and improvement of areas in need of redevelopment; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the LRHL, the Township Committee of the Township of Harding (the "Township Committee") designated properties located at Tempe Wick Road and Mount Kemble Avenue and designated on the Township's Tax Map as Block 27, Lot 2 and Block 34, Lot 1 as an area in need of redevelopment (the "Redevelopment Area"); and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee adopted the Hurstmont Redevelopment Plan, by Ordinance dated June 24, 2019, for the Redevelopment Area ("Redevelopment Plan") which sets forth, <u>inter alia</u>, the plan for the redevelopment of the Redevelopment Area; and

WHEREAS, a report of Qualifications dated June 14, 2019 (the "Report") for the redevelopment of the Redevelopment Area was submitted by Hurstmont Estate Acquisition, LLC (the "Redeveloper"); and

WHEREAS, Redeveloper is an affiliate of Endeavor Property Group; and

WHEREAS, the Report has been reviewed by NW Financial Group, LLC ("NW Financial"), a financial consultant to special counsel for redevelopment, Greenbaum, Rowe, Smith & Davis LLP; and

WHEREAS, NW Financial has made additional requests of the Redeveloper for the financial and operational capabilities of Hurstmont Estate Acquisition, LLC and Endeavor Property Group; and

WHEREAS, the Redeveloper has indicated that it will provide additional information in response to the requests of NW Financial; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee recognizes that there are certain inconsistencies between the development proposal in the Report and the Redevelopment Plan concerning characterization of the development as a "Continuing Care Retirement Community"; and

WHEREAS, the Report included provisions in the development proposal to satisfy the affordable housing requirements set forth in the Conditional Declaratory Partial Judgment of Compliance of the Superior Court of New Jersey entered March 28, 2019; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee believes that the inconsistencies between the Report and the Redevelopment Plan may be resolved in the process of negotiating the Redevelopment Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee expects that NW Financial will develop a detailed financial analysis of the Redeveloper and the final redevelopment proposal; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee desires that the Redevelopment Area be redeveloped by the Redeveloper; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee is authorized to exercise all powers under the LRHL, pursuant to *N.J.S.A.* 40A:12A-8, including but not limited to the ability to negotiate with developers to undertake redevelopment projects; and

WHEREAS, the Township Committee and the Redeveloper shall have a period of three (3) months until September 24, 2019 to agree on a specific development proposal and enter into a Redevelopment Agreement.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Harding that Hurstmont Estate Acquisitions, LLC is hereby designated as the redeveloper for the Redevelopment Area and the Mayor is hereby authorized to negotiate a Redevelopment Agreement with the Redeveloper to be approved by vote of the Township Committee; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution shall be effective for a period of three (3) months through September 24, 2019, after which time it shall be of no further force and affect unless the Redeveloper shall have entered into a Redevelopment Agreement with the Township of Harding; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Township Committee may withdraw this designation in the event that the Redeveloper fails to timely provide additional information requested by NW Financial, or if NW Financial is unable to issue an opinion that the proposal of Redeveloper is financially viable.

NON-CONSENT AGENDA VOTE:

Mayor Yates asks Committee Member Jones to proceed with Resolution TC 19-136 listed on the Non-Consent agenda.

Committee Member Jones made a motion to approve the resolution placed on this evening's Non-Consent Agenda by consent of the Township Committee.

Seconded by Township Committee Member Platt.

Mayor Yates asked if there was any discussion with regards to Resolution TC 19-136.

Mary Prendergast, resident – asked if the Qualification Report mentioned in the fourth Whereas dated June 14, 2019 was a public document. Mrs. Prendergast asked what the inconsistencies were mentioned in the eighth Whereas. Mayor Yates explained that the inconsistencies that are referred to in the resolution; in the State of New Jersey there is a statutory definition of a Continuing Care Retirement Center. The concept that the Township received from Hurstmont Acquisitions referred to CCRC. We have learned that they were using a less precise sort of industry term for the facility. There is a miss match between the statutory definition and what Hurstmont Acquisitions has been talking about. As part of the negotiation, this is what needs to be resolved; exactly what their definition of a CCRC is relative to the statutory definition. Their version does not include a skilled nursing facility. Until the Township actually

names them as a redeveloper, the Township cannot have the discussion with them. Mr. Hague, Special Counsel, provided further details on what information the redeveloper needs to provide to the township. Mr. Hague informed the Township Committee that with regard to the issue of skilled nursey, Mr. Hague and Mr. Haley were informed today (June 24th) is a practical matter. The State of New Jersey right now, the State does not issue certificates for skilled nursing which means if you follow the statutory definition of a CCRC which says independent living, assisted living, and skilled nursing, it is impossible for them to get skilled nursing certificates. Mr. Hague reported that you can get a certificate for assisted living which is happening on a regular basis. The independent living does not require a separate approvals from the State. Mayor Yates explained that there is a memory care unit in lieu of skilled nursing. Mr. Hague mentioned that memory care falls under assisted living.

Mrs. Prendergast commented that the person negotiating is the only the mayor. Mayor Yates explained that the negotiating committee consists of: Mr. Jones, Mr. Yates, Mr. Falzarano, Mr. Hague, Mr. Goldsmith, and Mrs. Gruel. Mr. Jones mentioned that the negotiating committee will not be making the decisions, it will be brought back to the Township Committee.

Mayor Yates asked for any further comments. With no further comments, Mayor Yates asked for a roll call. Mrs. Sharp called the roll. Let the record show that Mrs. DiTosto abstained from voting due to inconsistencies from the report and the redevelopment plan.

ADD-ON RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTIONS REMOVED FROM THE CONSENT AGENDA FOR DISCUSSION AND VOTE

Resolution TC 19-148 was removed from the consent agenda for further discussion.

Mr. Platt explained that in 2013, the Township Committee gave permission to reach out to the community due to the Municipal Building had fallen in disrepair. Mr. Platt reached out to the Kirby Foundation and to thirty individuals; eighteen (18) of which provided funding for the building. When Mr. Platt was making these appeals and received a grant from the Kirby Foundation, he mentioned that the building is the obligation of the taxpayer, the Township can give a C+ building not an A+.

Mr. Platt mentioned that the Kirby family undertook this project in 1978, the four children of Allen and Miriam Kirby gave this in dedication to their parents. Mr. Platt gave a pledge that if the Township received the monies (\$600,000+) towards the renovation of this building that it would be an A+ building. Mr. Platt believes it would be a disgrace, if the Township does not restore the building to the same condition the Kirby Family provided to the Township. The Township should honor the Kirby Family by at least putting the building back to the condition it was, and that would be to put shutters back onto the building. The shutters were rotting and

falling off and therefore removed. The shutters are following through on a pledge that Mr. Platt made when conducting the renovation.

Mr. Falzarano reported that what we found with the other vendors and originally this vendor, with the two samples that were installed on the building the shutters were bubbling on the raised panel part of the shutter. Mr. Toribio, DPW Superintendent, scratched the back portion of the shutter which is an engineered material (compressed board). The outcome; the exterior portion was PVC but the raised panels were not. Mr. Falzarano explained that the company was notified that the two panels were not good. They were informed that the Township is looking for an all PVC shutter, the paint is bubbling due to there is a rabbit on the outside of the frame that the panel sits in and when painted that the 3/8 of an inch around the panel is not sealed so it will weep up into the material. The company changed their process and the entire shutter is now all PVC. A discussion ensued.
